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
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PROGRAM COORDINATOR'S CORNER

WHERE'S DR. RAAB?

Well, he's actually still in his office most of the time – but he's not teaching this semester at all! Dr. Raab is taking a *sabbatical*. A sabbatical is a paid semester off from both teaching and administrative duties (like meetings). During the sabbatical semester, professors are usually working on researching and writing a book.

That's what Dr. Raab is doing. Dr. Raab has been researching and writing a book on Thomas Merton, a 20th century American Catholic Trappist monk, tentatively called *Searching a New Horizon: Seeds for a Contemplative Theology of Religious Pluralism in Thomas Merton's Dialogue with D. T. Suzuki*. Back in graduate school Dr. Raab wrote his dissertation on Merton and his interest in him persists. Merton was a leader in interreligious dialogue, especially between Catholics and Zen Buddhists. He also wrote about spirituality, how contemplation and action are related, and the negative effects that racism, propaganda, and sometimes technology can have on our society. If that weren't enough, his (accidental??) death has been the source of numerous conspiracy theories.

If you want to hear more about Merton, you could wait for the book to be published, or you can register for Dr. Raab's course on Merton in the Winter semester. **RST 326: Christian Spirituality** will focus on the life, writings, and spirituality of Thomas Merton – as well as the lessons he holds for us today. This course isn't regularly offered, and when it is, it's not always about Merton. So, this is your chance to take a really great course from an expert. While the topic may seem narrow, the influence of Merton on Catholic thinking is broad. In 2015 when Pope Francis visited the United States, Thomas Merton was one of four Americans (alongside Dorothy Day, Abraham Lincoln, and Martin Luther King, Jr.) that he called a source of wisdom for us today. Don't miss out on this course!
