The other day I came across a twitter exchange that reminded me of the importance of good theology. A woman asked for advice on finding God when God seems absent. She noted that her prayers feel as if they are going into the void. She got many responses, but the first two stuck out to me.

In the first reply, a woman explained that when she felt similarly, she turned to peers in a gardening group who gave her life. Through those relationships she began to see God again. This woman understood that God isn't just something or even someone out there, but rather that God happens here when we love our neighbors and allow ourselves to be loved by our neighbors. I found her advice both beautiful and practical - if you want to find God, join a gardening group (or any group you like). In the second reply, a twitter user asked if she might have committed a mortal sin. If she had, that would explain why God was not answering her. While sinfulness might prevent one from recognizing God's presence, it's hard for me to imagine this was a helpful response.

The legalistic approach to God in the second reply, which presents God as caring more about rules and jumping through hoops than actual human beings and their suffering, is not unique to the twitter user in reply #2. Good theology always requires critical thinking *and* empathy. Let's do some theology together and learn to be more like twitter reply #1. Next Fall's courses are listed on the back.
